WHO WE ARE ?



OVERVIEW

The Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) is an International Catholic Organisation, founded in 1980 by the Society of Jesus as a practical and spiritual response to the suffering displaced people. It started as a response of the suffering that Fr. **Pedro Arrupe, SJ, then Superior General of the Society of Jesus and founder of JRS**, saw on the refugees that were fleeing the Vietnam War. When he witnessed that suffering, he decided to mobilise human and financial resources of the Society of Jesus to offer relief and accompaniment to these people.

Shortly after, in 1982, the JRS moved to Ethiopia, their second project in our history, to respond to the suffering of the displaced people from the Ethiopia war. The Eastern Africa Region (EAR) was the first to be established in Africa and the second in the world.

Today, after more than 40 years of existence, JRS is active in **57 countries worldwide**, with the mission of accompanying, serving and defending the rights of refugees, internally displaced persons and anyone obliged to leave their homes forcefully.

The main strategic programme focus include: Education and Livelihoods, Mental Health and Psychosocial Support, and Reconciliation.

Vision

A world where refugees and the forcibly displaced people live in dignity and peaceful coexistence where their rights and responsibilities are recognized and safeguarded and each persons potential being realized in an orientation of service to others

Mission

Inspired by the generous love and example of Jesus Christ, JRS seeks to accompany, serve and advocate for the causes of refugees and other forcibly displaced people, that they may heal, learn and determine their own future

Core Values

In addition to the 4 Humanitarian principles of Impartiality, Neutrality, Humanity and Independence, the other core values of JRS which must find resonance in all our programming and support are: Hope, Dignity, Solidarity, Hospitality, Transparency, Accountability, Integrity, Participation and Justice

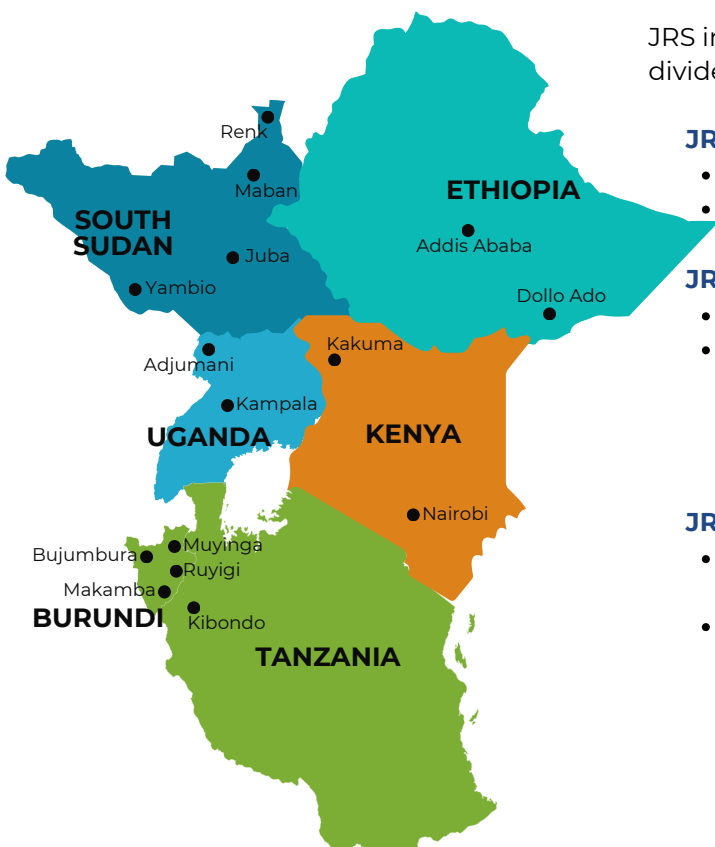

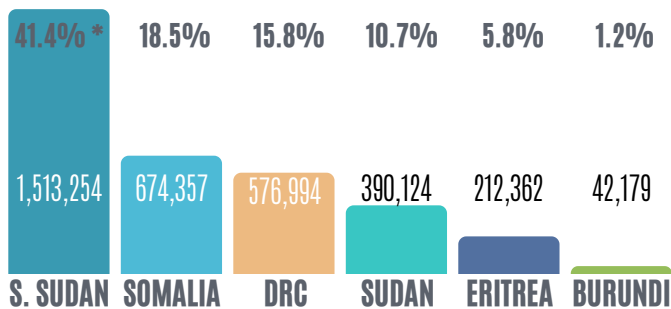

COUNTRY OF ORIGIN

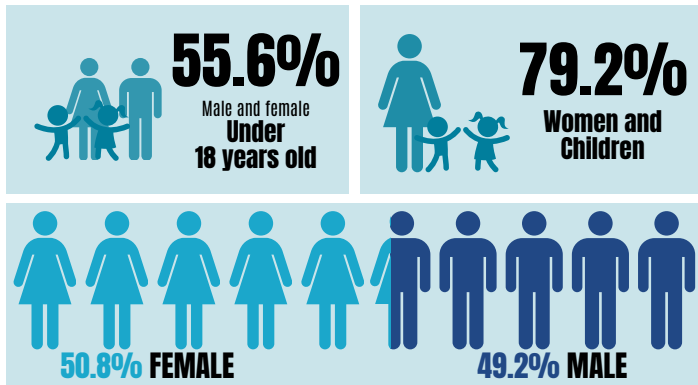
The main countries of origin of refugees and asylum seekers in Eastern Africa region come from the following countries:

If we look into the demographics of the refugee and forcibly displaced people in the region, it is as follows:



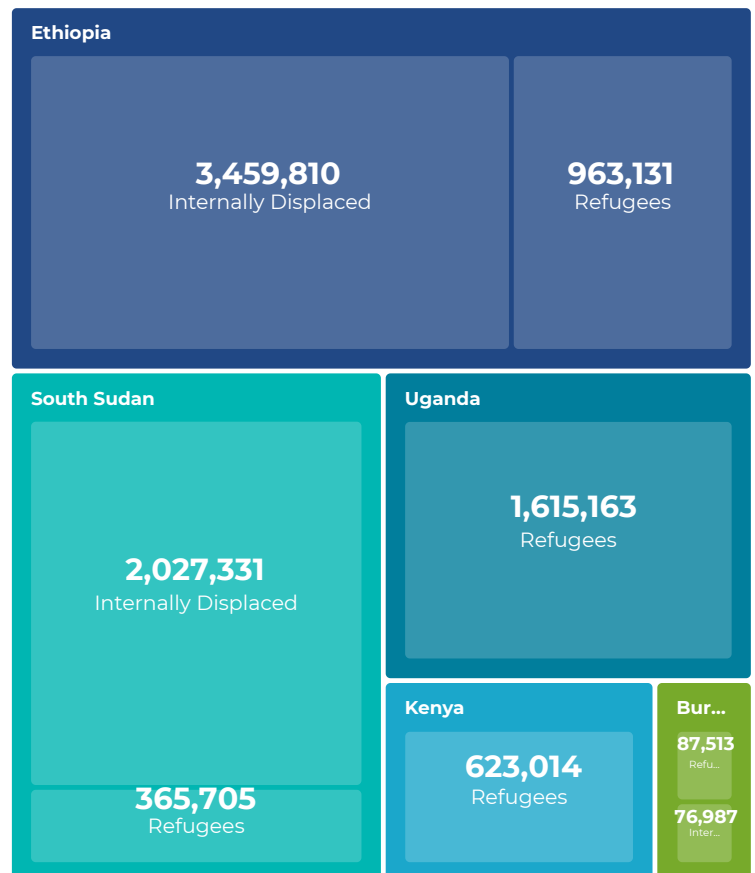
MOTIVATIONS FOR DISPLACEMENT

The majority of forcibly displaced people in our region is forced to migrate due to the following reasons:

- War and violent conflict
- Human Rights violations
- Access to land
- Climate: floods, drought and famine
- Terrorism

CURRENT CONTEXT

At this time, the region has faced some of the largest humanitarian crises in Africa generated by the escalation of armed conflicts in Sudan, Somalia, and the Great Lakes.

- **Sudan War:** prompted forced migrations and displacement of refugees and local population since April 2022.
- **Tigray War:** despite Peace has been signed among main counterparts in the conflict, its consequences and displacement are still affecting lots of people in the country.
- **Droughts and flooding:** affecting mainly Burundi, Somalia, Kenya, South Sudan and Ethiopia, these are triggering more movement of people.

EDUCATION & LIVELIHOODS

177,881 people

served in [livelihoods](#) and [education](#) programmes.

Education is JRS' cornerstone, which combined with Livelihoods activities offer a range of projects that support the learning, access to market, and resilience of our beneficiaries.

The activities we offer in these programmes are:

- **Scholarships** and financial support for vulnerable students with a special focus on girls' education.
- **Inclusive Education** for children with special needs, combined with rehabilitation, physiotherapy, awareness raising and referrals.
- **Adult Education**: numeracy and literacy, and Accelerated Learning Programmes.
- **Teacher Training** and specialised Early Childhood Development Education.
- **Post-Secondary Education** (Pathfinder), aiming at training youths in Business Skills to facilitate their inclusion in the labour market.
- **Vocational Training** to get the required skills to access the labour market.
- **Market Linkage**.

BASIC NEEDS & MHPSS

118,273 people

served in [basic needs](#), and [Mental Health and Psychosocial Support](#) programmes.

MHPSS (Mental Health and Psychosocial Support) are also one of the strengths of JRS in Eastern Africa Region, as part of our mission to accompany the most vulnerable refugees and forcibly displaced people. MHPSS and Emergency Support programmes tend to be combined with others to ensure sustainability.

The main activities carried out in this programmes are:

- **Counselling** with professional counsellors as individual session or with group sessions.
- **Emergency Support** with different food or Non-Food Items to cover basic needs.
- **Referrals** to other NGOs or for resettlement.

RECONCILIATION & PASTORAL

31,432 people

served in [reconciliation](#) and [pastoral](#) programmes.

Being in a volatile region, programmes of reconciliation and social cohesion are key. Parallel, as part of our mission and identity as a faith based organisation, we also offer pastoral accompaniment services for the catholic communities who might want them.

Beyond the specific activities we have, reconciliation is mainstreamed to all other activities we do.

Within those programmes, we offer the following activities:

- **Peace Clubs** in schools to promote peace education and peaceful conflict resolution.
- **Peace Ambassadors** training to deal with conflicts in the community in a peaceful way.
- **Reconciliation Groups** mainly working with community or clan leaders, for peaceful resolutions.
- **Sunday Services** in camps as well as basic services like communion or baptisms when requested.
- **Bible Studies** in some locations.
- **Pastoral accompaniment** to people in need.

PROTECTION

8,114 people

served in [protection](#) and [advocacy](#) programmes.

With a special focus on Gender Based Violence (GBV) survivors and children, being next to the most vulnerable is part of our Jesuit mission, reason why it is core to our identity.

The main activities carried out in this programmes are:

- **Safe Shelters** for GBV survivors. This is combined with group and individual counselling for GBV survivors.
- **Child Protection** centres for unaccompanied minors accompanied by activities as referrals, foster care arrangements and resettlements.
- **Child Care** for children with special needs, including child care units or rehabilitation services.
- **Advocacy** activities to defend the rights of the forcibly displaced people.
- **Referrals** to other NGOs for specific vulnerable cases.

RECONCILIATION THROUGH PEACE CLUBS IN BURUNDI

JRS Burundi has been working in different schools to train children and youth on the importance of peace and non-violent conflict resolution. Bringing children from different ages and nationalities together, they are trained to become spokespersons and peace ambassadors in their schools. ACCELERATED LEARNING PROGRAM IN SOUTH SUDAN

JRS has been offering an ALP (Accelerated Learning Programme) for adults in Yambio (Western Equatoria Estate) who could not finish their primary and secondary education as children. In many cases, war, the decease of the parents, or early marriage are some of the most common reasons for early school dropout.
